For this reason, and also because this year the 25th anniversary of that Chapter is being celebrated, we all wanted also to situate this dedication within the framework of this anniversary.

We hope you will find in the following pages continuations and developments of that underlying thread which began to be woven at that first International Congress on Technology, Sustainable Development and Imbalance held in Terrassa in December 1995, which Pere Duran i Farell opened with these words:

"In the present day, in this world of science and technology, we must try to make technologists and scientists as fundamental and decisive as wise men, understanding wisdom as the attitude of the man who morally enriches his knowledge and who, at the same time, legitimises its application... The technological world will be of little use if we do not know where we are going, and still less if we are not sufficiently aware of the need to establish as a priority to know where we are going."
